

# OTIS HARCEY, UTICA PIONEER IS DEAD

Lived in County Over Half  
a Century

## HUNDREDS ATTEND SERVICES FOR VETERAN FARMER AND STOCKMAN WEDNESDAY

Hundreds of friends and relatives were in Utica Wednesday to be present at the funeral services for Otis Harcey, farmer and stock buyer for nearly half a century there. Services were held at 1:30 p. m. from the Presbyterian church, Rev. Lawrence of Lewiston officiating, and interment was made in the church cemetery. Pall bearers were Robert Bole, Willard Doolittle, Edward Posz, John Campbell, W. E. Brown and Charles Nettleton.

Mr. Harcey died Saturday, following a week's illness of pneumonia.

Born in New York state May 10, 1858, he came with his parents to Minnesota when he was but five years old. His parents settled in St. Charles township, and here Mr. Harcey grew to manhood.

In 1891, he was married to Miss Hannah Sherman, and the young couple continued to farm the home place until 1900 when ill health forced Mr. Harcey to move to Utica. Since then he has been a stock buyer for a Winona packing house. His long residence in the county has gained him a wide acquaintance and scores of friends who were saddened at the news of his death.

Surviving Mr. Harcey is one daughter, Ella, Mrs. John Henry, who resided with him, and one brother, Frank, who lives on a farm near Utica. Mrs. Harcey died April 1, 1891.
