



GEORGE B. TALBOT

Prayers for George B. Talbot, pioneer Winona county resident who died at his home, 714 West Wabasha street, Sunday afternoon at the age of 77 following a lingering illness, will be said at the home Thursday at 10 a. m. by the Rev. Dr. J. J. Hillmer. The body will then be taken to St. Charles, where funeral services will be conducted at 2 p. m. at the home of Mrs. Fred Talbot by the Rev. Geo. S. Keller of Winona. Burial will be made in Hillside cemetery at St. Charles.

Mr. Talbot was born in West Penard, Somersetshire, England, Oct. 15, 1846, and was reared on a dairy farm. In 1852 he came to this country, joining his father and two brothers who had preceded him, and located with them at Dyersville, Iowa.

In 1855 he came with the family to St. Charles, where he was one of the first pupils to attend the log schoolhouse which stood on his father's farm. In 1874 he purchased a farm of 160 acres in St. Charles township to which he afterwards added another 160 acres, and erected modern farm buildings. The farm is still the property of the family.

He retired from the farm in November, 1893, coming to Winona. He purchased the lot and erected the home at 714 West Wabasha street, where he had since resided. He was a member of the Winona county Old Settlers association.

Mr. Talbot was married March 11, 1874, to Mary A. Gibbs, who survives him, along with two daughters, Hannah A., wife of C. F. Camp of this city, and Ada M., wife of Frank Wunderlich of St. Paul.

ST. CHARLES PIONEER DIES WINONA; IS BURIED HERE

**George B. Talbot Last Survivor of
Pioneer Family of Nine; Came
to St. Charles In 1855**

George B. Talbot, one of the earliest pioneers of St. Charles and the last of a family of nine who made this their home for many years, died at his home in Winona Sunday afternoon. He was 77 years old. All of the brothers and sisters have descendants living in this section now. There were four brothers, William, Henry, Fred and George, and five sisters, Mrs. Mary Hatch, Mrs. Sarah Ham, Mrs. Anna Turner, Mrs. Phyllis Barr and Mrs. Sophie Small.

Prayers were said at the home of Mr. Talbot yesterday morning by Rev. Dr. J. J. Hillmer and the body was then brought to the home of Mrs. Fred Talbot in St. Charles where services were conducted by Rev. George S. Keller of the Winona Episcopal church. Interment was made in Hillside cemetery.

The widow and two daughters survive. The latter are Mrs. Hannab A. Camp of Winona and Mrs. Ada M. Wunderlich of St. Paul.

Mr. Talbot was born in West Penard, Somersetshire, England, Oct. 15, 1846, and lived on a dairy farm. He came to the United States in 1852 to join his father and two brothers at Dyersville, Ia. In 1855 the family came to Winona county and Mr. Talbot was one of the first pupils to attend the first log school house which stood on his father's farm. He purchased a farm in St. Charles township in 1874, the year of his marriage to Miss Mary A. Gibbs, and later added another quarter section to it. The property still belongs to the family.

He retired in 1893 and went to Winona to live.

Mr. Talbot was a member of the Winona County Old Settlers' association and one of the most respected pioneers of the county.
